2018 Rec Hockey Calgary AGM

President's Report (James Mills)

In the 2017 – 2018 season Recreational Hockey Calgary continued its' commitment to creating an environment where children between the ages of 11 and 20 can have fun through participation in the game of hockey. Team sports have a positive impact on children's self-esteem, fitness and social skills. Being part of a team and working toward common objectives results in valuable skills as children become young adults and enter the workforce. Close to 850 children and young adults shared in these benefits through participation with RHC this season.

Our organization continues to maintain a strong membership with 50 teams in total; 8 in Pee Wee, 12 in Bantam, 16 in Midget and 14 in Junior. As in past years, our registrar and the coordinators worked hard through October to place additional players that were initially wait-listed.

The relationship RHC enjoys within the Hockey Calgary and the Hockey Alberta family remains strong. RHC is an active participant in the Hockey Calgary president's council. Communication between RHC and the Central Zone Referees Committee¹ (CZRC) is open and ongoing.

RHC is continuing to search for sponsorship for the upcoming 2018-19 season.

RHC provided a 4 team sportsmanship awards for teams that played penalty free games during January and February. The awards were presented to one team in each age group based on lottery results. This award is completely sponsored by RHC and each winning team receives a \$200 gift card for a pizza lunch during the Year End Tournament (YET).

Many thanks to all our volunteers for an extremely successful season. RHC is blessed with hugely dedicated, passionate and knowledgeable coaches, assistant coaches, managers, off-ice officials and board members. These individuals give their time and energy to ensure our children are provided a fun, safe and enjoyable environment to play our unique brand of minor hockey.

¹ CZRC (http://czrc.ab.ca) is a subcommittee of the Hockey Alberta Referees' Council. Central Zone is one of 6 Referee Zones in the province and includes the areas of Calgary, Banff, Claresholm, Strathmore, and Drumheller to name a few. This past season CZRC was home to 1400+ officials. CZRC through its executive is responsible for and oversees all officials within its' boundaries. CZRC is responsible for assigning officials to all RHC games.

2018 Rec Hockey Calgary AGM

Vice President Report (Jamie Mills)

The 2017-2018 RHC season was a great success. There were some excellent moments throughout the season in which I was proud to be a volunteer for such a great organization. The service we provide for young hockey players in Calgary is truly inspiring to me and I hope we will be able to provide it for years to come.

To this end, I worked in an attempt to secure a sponsorship for RHC. This process began with a letter to our membership asking if anyone was willing to help arrange such a partnership. I am proud to say that the response from our members was overwhelming and we are close to a deal that could mean big things for RHC going forward. This money will help to pay for new sweaters for our teams, as well as subsidize the ever increasing costs of ice and referees associated with running a hockey league in Calgary.

It was a quiet year from the discipline perspective. The discipline committee met a few times but overall it was a good season with EMHW and the YET both going smoothly. There were a few disciplinary actions taken at Midget during the YET but overall good season.

Next season I will continue to work on the sponsorship front. I feel this effort is important to RHC and we should continue to push hard to develop a successful partnership that will ensure we can provide the level of service our participants have grown useful. I will also train the incoming board members on team formation. The session we held at the beginning of the year for this purpose was well received and I will run it again.

I'd like to thank all the dedicated volunteers who stepped up to help coach, manage or support any of our teams. These people are key to our league and are a large part of the fun environment we seek to provide. Lastly, I'd like to thank all my fellow board members. Without all your hard work, it would be impossible to run this league. You all went out to games, checked game sheets, dealt with coaches and parents and enabled fun for the kids. From planning PeeWee development sessions to coming up with creative ideas for marketing and sponsorship, you are an amazing group of people and the league would not exist without you.

Treasurer's Report for April 17th 2018 AGM

The Association started off the 2017-2018 fiscal year with \$119,010 in the bank balance dated March 23, 2017. We ended the year with a bank balance of \$121,526 as of March 23, 2018.

Revenue in the way of player fees was \$476,399 for 837 registered players which was approximately \$48,000 less than the approved budget based on 900 players. Balance carried forward from previous year was \$46,374. The total revenues for 2017-2018 were \$534,105 that includes donation received, interest from bank and GST refund.

The total expenses for the 2017-2018 were \$501,531. The Hockey Calgary and Hockey Alberta Fees, Hockey Calgary Building Fund and Team Registration came to the total of \$113,265. The total amount for ice rental was \$245,311 (GST included). The Hockey Calgary used the Casino funds proceeds to cover playoff/YET officials' fees and did not pass on the cost to our Association. This has kept our officials costs at \$65,612 for the whole season.

The Association has \$72,474 (cash) as per the bank closing balance on April 2nd 2018 and \$40,000 GIC. That placed the organization total net asset value at \$112,424 as of April 2nd 2018 as outlined on the attached Revenue/Expense Statement (page 2).

The proposed budget for the 2018-2019 fiscal year is based on 840 players (50 teams). The expenses budgeted are mostly the actuals incurred this past year except for the ice rental and referees assigning fees. The ice rental budget included 2% increment. Additional \$50.00 was included to the individual player registration fee and additional \$100.00 to the goalie registration fee.

Equipment Report (Helen Mills)

Equipment Pickup – September 2017

Equipment was available for pickup by coaches directly after the coaches meeting that was held on September 17. 48 out of the 50 teams took the opportunity to pick up on that day. The final 2 teams picked up the following week.

Equipment Return – March / April 2018

There were 2 dates for equipment return – March 24 and April 7. The following sets are still outstanding:

PeeWee – Kings, Senators Bantam – Penguins and the jersey bag for the Bruins Midget – Bruins, Fighting Irish, Hurricanes, Whalers Junior – all returned

A complete review of the available equipment will be undertaken in the coming weeks. Severely damaged and missing jerseys will be ordered along with sets of socks for the upcoming season. First aid kits will be replenished. Everything will be set to hand out after next season's coaches meeting.

PeeWee Coordinator's Report (Dave Hunter)

The 2017/2018 Recreational Hockey Calgary season was a huge success.

Overview:

We had 8 teams consisting of 16 players each. All the teams were pretty well balanced, however, there was one team that won most of their games and one team that lost most of their games. The biggest factor in this disparity was the incorrect data received on skill levels of individual players. Especially the goalies. As I attended all the games, I was proud of the fact that we had some terrific Coaches, players and parents. There was an atmosphere of good sportsmanship displayed by all the teams.

We had a couple of special needs players, one with Autism, and one with Cerebral Palsy. Both the Coaches and players accepted and worked with these players to ensure that they had a great experience throughout the season.

I spoke with many of the parents and Coaches and have had great response to returning for another season with RHC.

Discipline/Penalties:

Out of the 135 games played this season, we had 218 minor penalties. This is a decrease of 56 penalties from last season. There was one player who did have a three penalties in one game, which resulted in a one game suspension. During the first half of the season, there were only 74 minor penalties, and the ESSO Minor Hockey Week, saw the intensity of players increase quite dramatically. I took the opportunity to talk with all the Players, and suggested that all slashing, cross checking and head contact penalties were grievous because they are intentional. After this, those penalties were reduced almost 100%.

There were a few injuries to report. One player collided into the boards during the ESSO tournament and broke a bone in his foot. A few games after the tournament, one player crashed with another player and received a cut from a skate. I administered emergency first aid and got that player to the hospital. He received 9 stitches. He returned to play missing only two games. It was at the Year End Tournament that another player crashed into the boards and broke a bone in her hand.

Goalies/Players:

Overall, there was a feeling of sportsmanship displayed by all players. Our spare goalie came down with a stomach infection and was unable to play for the rest of the season after the ESSO tournament. The Goalie for The Senators stepped up and spared for the other teams when needed and also got some experience sparing for a couple of the Bantam teams.

Pee Wee Coordinator's Report continued...

Officials/Safety/Complaints:

We had a great bunch of referees this season. There was only a couple of minor complaints about the aggressive behaviour on ice that the ref's didn't call. A few games got called more tightly and the aggressive behaviour during these games were non-existent. More diligence for the referees may have an impact on future games within the RHC system.

Player Ratings:

All of the Coaches gave their skill ratings and seemed pretty consistent to the skill levels I had observed during play this season. This information should be helpful when Teams are being generated for next year's hockey season.

Coaches/Volunteers:

Each team had one head coach and two assistant coaches. To me they were exceptional. They all kept to the philosophy of fair play that RHC abides to. There were no issues with regards to player safety, player's ice time, or promoting fun for all. Managers and off ice volunteers were able to make the games more fun, as many had music for each of the games.

Final Message:

This was my first year as a coordinator, and I enjoyed the season tremendously. I promoted fair play, clean hockey, and safe practices on the ice to all the teams. During the end of the season I handed out dozens of flyers to promote our membership. This was received very well, and I hope it makes an impact on next year's numbers.

I want to give many thanks to the Coaches, Players, and Parents who made this year a fun and exciting season of Pee Wee Hockey.

PeeWee Development (Steve Turner, Doug Altrogge)

We had a great time with this year PeeWee Development sessions. Over the 8 weeks of sessions with 4 ice times per week. Doug and I decided to run two teams per session on one full ice surface. We would like to thank the PeeWee Coordinator, team coaches and our Junior coaches for volunteering this years.

This year Doug and I broke out into two groups during each session. Doug led the skating, puck handling, and shooting drills, while I worked with the group of goalies. We encouraged the coaches, and Junior coaches to demonstrate and lead some of the drills. With the coaches being mixed into the drills, it allowed them to gather a better assessment of each players abilities and correct them on the ice with them rather than from the bench on game days.

Next year sessions will be arranged the same manner but with more involvement from the Junior coaches leading the sessions.

Bantam Coordinators' Report (Grant Caswell, Dan Parsons)

<u>Overview</u>

There were 187 players registered for the 2017-18 season and 12 teams were formed.

The teams were initially divided into A and B groups, each with six teams. The A group contained teams with a higher skill level compared to the B group.

However, after two months of play, it was apparent that an additional, third grouping would be required due to skill and score disparities of teams within both A and B groups. As a result, in December 2017, the two divisions were broken into a hybrid league with A, B and C groups (similar to the 2016-17 season), each with four teams. This seemed to work relatively well. There was a team in C group that continued to have trouble competing, but the coach and assistant coaches communicated with coordinators and strategies were developed to keep the games enjoyable for the kids with affiliates.

Team Formation

Similar to the 2016-17 season, team formation was based on player experience, registration skill ratings and coach skill ratings for returning players. Friend requests were also considered.

As indicated earlier in this report, 187 players, 12 teams were formed.

Three to four coach volunteers were also placed on each team.

Following the division of the team into A and B groups, there were a few teams that were stronger than the rest and a couple of teams in each grouping that were struggling. As a result, a hybrid league was created with three groups of A, B and C, each with four teams. The "A" teams played within their group as well as teams in group "B". "C" group teams played "C" group teams and "B" group teams. "B" group played against teams from all groups. The hybrid was a little more forgiving for teams that were on the bubble in their grouping, while giving all teams a variety of other teams to play in comparison to a straight split in groups.

To help out the weaker teams, volunteer players were found from other teams that would play for them as affiliates. This helped them be more competitive and gave them some time to build confidence.

EMHW & YET

Both tournaments were successful.

In both the EMHW and YET, teams played within their A, B, and C groups and the games were close and competitive. The finals were all generally close games.

Penalties/Discipline

There were 575 penalties called in 220 games played. Tripping, bodychecking and hooking were the top three penalties.

There were 84 players who received the individual sportsmanship award for having no penalties assessed during the course of the entire season.

This year, the Ducks received the pizza party award as a result of the draw based on zero penalties in a given game.

Over the course of the season, there were eight player suspensions and one coach suspension. Four of the player suspensions were for checking from behind, one was for roughing, one was for head contact, one was for boarding, and one was for unsportsmanlike conduct. The Coach suspension was for harassment of officials / unsportsmanlike conduct.

Coaching

The RHC philosophy continues to be a struggle for a minority of coaches (predominantly coaches coming from community hockey), who place winning at all costs above sportsmanship. However, both correspondence and personal conversations in-person / via phone seemed to help provide mitigation and realignment of RHC values.

Injuries

There were a few injuries which could be considered serious given the non-contact nature of the league. These included a couple players with concussion. There was a normal assortment of less significant injuries besides those noted above.

Officiating

Generally, the officiating was good over the year. We had some informal complaints about consistency of calls and missed calls allowing aggressive play to escalate.

Issues/Complaints

Similar to last year, there were some coaching challenges pertaining to adoption of the RHC philosophy of facilitation of sportsmanlike, fun play for the kids. However, both correspondence and personal conversations in-person / via phone seemed to help provide mitigation and re-alignment of RHC values.

There were also coaching concerns during the season with the level of game management by the referees and either too many calls or too few calls being made. However, this was generally sporadic and not indicative of the full year, where the feedback was positive.

Midget Coordinators' Report (Crystal Fitzgerald, Heather St. Louis)

The season went well. We had 287 players, 18 goaltenders and formed 16 teams. We were down two teams from the 2016/2017 season due to a lack of goaltenders.

Following the seeding round the teams were broken into an A and B division with 10 and 6 teams respectively. There was good parity in both the A and B groups but a few very weak goal tenders affected the success of their teams.

Out of 16 or 17 League games:

A Division -9/10 teams won/tied at least 8 or more games -(7/10 won/tied 10 or more games)

B Division - 5/6 teams won/tied at least 7 or more games - (4/6 won/tied 11 or more games)

Team Formation

Team formation was based on registration skill ratings, coach ratings, last year's team placement if new to RHC and prior years' statistics. There were a number of changes made at the beginning of the season due to circumstances such as players withdrawing, injury and one missed friend request. We granted all reciprocated friend requests. We ensured all female players had another female player on the same team. We placed weaker goalies with strong defense and we added as many wait list players as possible.

Player evaluations

Player evaluations have been received from all 16 head coaches. This year coaches did a better, more comprehensive job of evaluating their players.

Parents and Coaches

We had a few complaints about one head coach (both formally and informally) and we supervised many of the games. Although we did notice an improvement in his behavior his team ended up with poor attendance, players quitting and a lot of losses.

We had conflict between two teams (coaches, players, and parents). The games had to be supervised during EMHW and for the remainder of the season.

We had two coaches suspended for gross misconducts.

The majority of comments from parents and coaches were praise for the great group of kids on their teams. A number of teams arranged their own year-end pizza parties, and a couple of teams had different year end parties.

EMHW and YET

Both tournaments went well. There were a lot of close, one goal games and only a handful of "blow-outs" which were mostly the result of weak goaltenders or poor attendance. EMHW games had a number of shoot outs and overtime final in A. For the YET we did four groups of four. The games and attendance were good for all but one team. Bracket 1 went to a shootout in the final and two other finals were one goal games.

Penalties and Discipline

There were 1336 penalties called in 300 games. The top 3 penalty types were tripping, body checking and hooking. There were a total of 55 suspensions with 31 of these being Hockey Calgary infractions and the remainder violations of the 3 penalty per game, or 20 or 25 penalties per season rules.

Injuries

There were typical minor and medium level injuries that we are aware of. There were two concussions early in the season. One player was gone for eight weeks and the other was gone two weeks. Play tends to escalate during the tournaments and at the YET we had one shoulder injury, one dislocated knee and an ankle injury.

Officiating

There was one formal complaint regarding the officiating during the year. Informally one coach asked about contesting a suspension. Also informally a number of parents and coaches noted a lack of calls being made by the referees this season, allowing the rough play to escalate. Some noted there was a lot more contact than they were expecting in Rec. There were a number of incidents where referees wrote up their calls incorrectly on the game sheets, resulting in lower or no penalties being assessed.

Issues and Complaints

A number of times we had to ask coaches to ease up rather than run up the score. Two teams in particular carried this behavior up to and including the YET. A few coaches complained about the lack of parity in the league early in the season but by mid-season this had balanced out. We added players to a couple of teams to help. One coach refused the extra wait list player, we added him anyways, and the team ended up winning EMHW. Player attendance and coach complaints were an issue for one of the teams and had an impact on their success. There were three goaltenders that were well below the average skill level. Although they had a significant impact on their teams we didn't hear a single complaint from any of the coaches or parents.

Junior Coordinators' Report (Eloise Berry, Rob Van Walleghem, Cam Morash)

Generally the season went well. We had 241 players and formed 14 teams. We had 14 goalies and 1 spare. We occasionally drew from the Midget goalie pool. Following the seeding round the teams were broken into A and B groups with 8 and 6 teams respectively. It was difficult to separate the teams in the middle of the pack into either A or B. Even after the split there was disparity between the top and bottom teams although all teams won at least 3 games.

Player evaluations have been received from many of the coaches. The coaches like the new format of the evaluation form.

Team Formation

Team formation was based on registration friend requests, coach ratings, player's self-evaluation and prior years' statistics.

We granted all reciprocated friend requests. We tried to spread the top skilled game-changer players around. We attempted to ensure female players had another female player on the same team. Finally, when we drew from the waitlist we tried to put stronger players on weaker teams.

We were fortunate to have 1 goalie, 1 head coach and 1-3 assistant coaches for each team.

EMHW and **YET**

Both tournaments went well. There were a lot of close, 1-goal games and only a handful of "blow-outs". For the YET we put 6 teams in the middle bracket and 4 in each of the top and bottom brackets.

Penalties and Discipline

There were 1401 penalties called in 263 games for an average of 5.3 penalties per game. This is almost identical to the previous year where there were 5.2 penalties per game. Tripping and body checking were the top 2 types of penalty by a wide margin.

There were a total of 41 suspensions with 14 of these being Hockey Calgary infractions and the remainder violations of the 3 penalty per game, misconduct in the last 10 minutes or 20 penalties per season rules.

Injuries

There were typical minor and medium level injuries that we are aware of. There were no major injuries noted.

Officiating

There were no formal complaints regarding the officiating during the year. Informally we had a few coaches, parents and even one player remark that certain games should have been called more closely as the aggressiveness escalates and the potential for injury increases. On the other hand we had a few coaches complain that a particular player received an excessive penalty for incidental contact.

There were a number of incidents where game sheets were written up either incorrectly or in a manner which was confusing. This may be more of a reflection of the volunteer scorekeepers than the referees.

Issues and Complaints

A number of times we had to ask the coaches to ease up rather than run up the score. We had to remind them of the Rec Hockey philosophy.

We received a few complaints from coaches, parents and players about the lack of parity in the league.

Player attendance was an issue for some teams.

There were allegations of inappropriate behaviour towards one of the female players on the ice. As the incident was not heard by an official there was no formal discipline action. However, we brought it to the attention of the coaches and players involved and resolved it in a manner satisfactory to all parties.

Referee Liaison Report (Clint Fitzgerald)

It was a quiet season with respectful coaches and parents.

I had a few complaints (formally and informally) from coaches questioning referee calls and write-ups. I had a few inquiries from parents on how to complain about the quality of refereeing they have witnessed (to my knowledge no one followed through). There were a number of questions about rules and write-ups from coordinators that were resolved. I had a few questions during an issue with two coaches being suspended and adding extra game suspensions for penalties that resulted in injuries.

I attended the CZRC meetings during the season (all but 1) and except for the discussion on assigning fees and the involvement of Hockey Alberta most of the information didn't directly impact RHC.

It was a good season. My son's team was filled with great kids who had a lot of fun and really liked their teammates and coaches. The parents and coaches I spoke with at the arena and through emails were nice, respectful, polite and enjoying the year.

Registrar's Report (Cathy Hosowich)

Registration opened May 15^{th,} 2017 for returning players and open registration started on June 1st. This season was the eighth year that we used the Hockey Canada online registration system and was again another successful year. With constant postings on our web tab, registrations proceeded without many issues.

Registrations for the 2017-2018 Season

PeeWee had 8 teams – 126 players (7 females) and 29 coaches Bantam had 12 teams – 191 players (10 females) and 44 coaches Midget had 16 teams – 275 players (3 females) and 57 coaches Junior had 14 teams – 242 players (3 females) and 42 coaches Midget teams were down this year, due to a lack in goalies.

Total players for the season - 834 Total of 50 Teams

Transfer IN requests: 259 Transfer out requests: 46

PeeWee had 8 teams, with 125 players (3 females) and 33 coaches Bantam had 14 teams, with 197 players (11 females) and 46 coaches Midget had 18 teams, with 305 players (3 females) and 72 coaches Junior had 14 teams, with 239 players (3 females) and 42 coaches.

COACH SAFETY

This was our 5th season for the coach safety program; where 1 coach must have this qualification on each team. It wasn't as difficult a task, as I could work on it as we went along. More and more coaches are getting certified, and that's a good thing.

TRANSFERS

This is the process that occurs when a player wants to move from one Association to another. Hockey Canada allows a member to belong to only one minor hockey association at a time. It is a pretty easy process for local transfers. Across Canada takes a bit longer, while international transfers take weeks, and can take even months. We get many transfer in requests, but very few transfer out requests.

FEES

Our registration fees will be increased this upcoming season, as ice and officials will increase. \$625 per player in PeeWee and Bantam, and for Junior and Midget, the fee will be \$650. Our goalie fees will be \$400 for all levels, and the spare goalie position will be \$150.
